3 Types of Nuclear Strategies

...according to Vipin Narang

1. Catalytic

Bring patron closer to nuclear-supplying client by

2. Asymmetric Escalation

 Nuclear first-use as way of de-escalation or political benefit

3. Assured Retaliation

 Deploy nuclear weapons to ensure ability to launch return strikes

What Others Believe

Peacetime Strategy: Asymmetric Escalation

First-use strategy, if North Korea sees China as possible patron

Wartime Strategy: Catalytic

• Scaring China to intervene on North Korea's behalf and join their side

Opposing Arguments

- Track record of military posturing and lack of credible evidence
- Subvert goal of regime survival
- History of foreign policy independence from China
- Self-reliance ethos means unlikely to use strategy of dependence on China
- Strained relationship with China
- Security commitment is unreliable

What The Author Believes

Peacetime Strategy: Assured Retaliation

• Return strikes against them

Wartime Strategy: Asymmetric Escalation

• Use nuclear weapons to end conflict

Reasoning

- During wartime, less restraint needed
- "Use or lose" incentive if regime change seems imminent
- End problem quickly—don't have capacity for sustained military campaign

The US and North Korea

What should the US prepare for if North Korea adopts an **asymmetric escalation nuclear strategy**?

- Contingency plans
- Scenario-based analyses with limited scope & objective
- Factor in the likely trajectory of North Korea's nuclear/missile programs

Realistic Threat

- Currently, doesn't alter the situation in the region
- In early phases of testing (still several years of tests required)
- Question of submarine capability
- Gaining time to build up nuclear deterrent
- People want to believe the worst/extreme because
 North Korea is one of the few "closed places"



- Isn't joking about building up deterrent to protect itself
- With border close to Seoul, any action against North Korea would likely lead to Seoul's destruction
- Information from North
 Korea may come from people
 with an interest in shaping it
- Inherent unpredictability allows to manipulate other countries
